Policies & Practices

Spring 2022 Project: The Vegetation Management Division of the City of Winston-Salem identified four fairly identical landscapes beds at Bethabara Park and Harambe Park. For each location, one bed will be treated with an inorganic herbicide and the other bed with an organic herbicide. Vegetation Management will keep up with the cost of treatment, equipment, materials, labor, and the overall efficiency of each treatment. The two beds on Bethabara Park consist of holly bushes, redbud trees and some liriope. At Harambe Park, the beds consist of ornamental elm trees, crepe myrtles, and one cherry tree.
